DIRECTOR'S NOTE

This August Idaho Policy Institute passed a huge milestone - for five years now we've served as an objective research resource for Idaho's communities. By the numbers IPI's outputs have been significant. We have secured over \$2 million in sponsored research, provided over 70 reports for our project partners, and have published seven peer-reviewed articles. In this time, nearly 100 students have been part of the MPA Capstone class which has collectively worked with 42 external nonprofit and government partners. What is arguably more important, however, is the impact IPI's work has had on the communities in which we serve. For instance, our work on New Path Community Housing has led to the outcomes of saving community resources (over \$2.6 million) while also improving the health and well-being of New Path program participants (60 individuals have participated in the program). Our analysis of Idaho's transportation infrastructure helped lead to increased permanent funding for Idaho's roads and bridges. As part of IPI's strategic plan implementation, we will be taking a huge step toward measuring the outcomes related to our research and technical assistance. The analysis will enable IPI to identify how we can best serve our current and future partners and also enable us to improve our engaged research. It can also help us identify where we need to more actively engage with partners on campus.

As I reflect on IPI's first five years I couldn't be prouder of our achievements and of the students, faculty, and staff who make IPI an impactful resource for Idaho. My gratitude to all IPI team members past and present for your hard work and dedication! In addition, thank you to all our internal and external partners who support IPI!

PROJECT SPOTLIGHT

PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING COMPARATIVE ANALYSIS

Permanent supportive housing (PSH) uses a Housing First approach to house people experiencing homelessness and living with a disabling condition. Idaho Housing and Finance Association (IHFA) partnered with Idaho Policy Institute (IPI) to conduct a statewide evaluation comparing scattered-site and single-site PSH programs at Low-Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) properties in Idaho. Of the 151 PSH units in Idaho, 96 are in service consisting of 30 scattered-site and 66 single-site units. Additionally, 55 scattered-site units are anticipated to open in the next two years. No single-site PSH programs using LIHTC are planned. Future single-site PSH programs will require strong public-private partnerships modeled after successful programming in Ada County.

Key Findings:

- No difference exists between construction costs of scattered-site and single-site PSH units at LIHTC properties.
- Future evaluations require increased coordination of data collection and designating LIHTC properties as unique programs in Homeless Management Information Systems (HMIS).
- All regions in Idaho will benefit from expanded PSH programming.
- The lack of providers is a barrier to providing supportive services in rural communities.
- More vulnerable populations benefit from on-site supportive services provided by single-site PSH programs.

STUDENT INVOLVEMENT

MPA CAPSTONE WORKS WITH SEVEN COMMUNITY PARTNERS

This fall, MPA Capstone students will be working with seven new partners, five nonprofit partners and two government partners. This month I'll highlight three of the nonprofits: Boise Elevated, Idaho Walk Bike Alliance, and United Way of the Treasure Valley. The students working with Boise Elevated will set up an evaluation of HB392 - a bill passed in last year's Idaho Legislature intended to grant property tax relief. The evaluation will be carried out in spring 2022 - a year after the bill's implementation. The Idaho Walk Bike Alliance team will examine the last five years of crash data where the collision was between a vehicle and a bicyclist or pedestrian. Results will help the organization target interventions to reduce critical crashes. Finally, students partnering with United Way of the Treasure Valley will conduct an evaluation of Idaho's community school program. Results will help United Way grow the program to more communities across the state.

CONNECTED CANYON COUNTY

DIVISION OF MOTOR VEHICLES (DMV) SERVICE DELIVERY MODEL

IPI's research team finalized the survey instrument, to be distributed in early September, asking state DMV administrators about their state's service delivery model, including jurisdiction responsibilities, number of offices and agents, transactions, hours of operation, and customers served. Researchers also finished collecting and analyzing DMV data on all 44 Idaho counties and mapped it on several Tableau dashboard visualizations. The team met with Idaho Transportation Department and DMV officials to provide an update on the project's progress. Researchers continue to sift through relevant literature on DMV service delivery to identify the benefits and challenges of possible solutions, including possible recommendations for current model improvements.

IDAHO OUTDOOR RECREATION SURVEY

At the end of July, IPI submitted a response to a request for proposals from the Idaho State Department of Parks and Recreation to help them complete a statewide outdoor recreation survey. This month, IPI was selected to complete the project. For this project, IPI will be working with Dr. Kathryn Demps from Boise State's Anthropology Department to create and distribute a survey to a demographically and regionally representative sample of Idahoans.

RURAL INDUSTRY CLUSTER NEEDS ASSESSMENT
